- Attended 6 board meetings and 3 executive board meetings

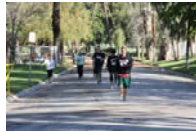

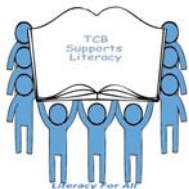
